Christian Aid

The Christian Aid Committee consists of 4 people from St Cuthbert's, 4 from the Parish Church and 1 unattached.

In the past year we have raised funds for the Christmas Appeal (Everyone should have enough to eat this Christmas), for the Christian Aid Week Appeal (Stronger than the Storms), and for our on-going link partner project in Ghana, GEOP (Growing Economic Opportunities for Sustainable Development Project).

We have organised Carol Singing in Bonaly, a Quiz Night, the May Door-to-Door collection in Colinton which involved 65 collectors covering about 80 areas of differing sizes. Our final event before the AGM will be a Gin Tasting at the Colinton Inn, a new venture which will, we hope, extend our our profile into the wider community.

With almost £2000 given at the Parish Church Christmas services, and a donation of £1000 from one person, we have raised about £11,300 this year.

Eco Congregation

The Eco-congregation initiative in Edinburgh continues to encourage and promote action and information on a wide range of subjects concerning us all locally, nationally and internationally.

Climate Change is now always on the agenda and Ecocongregation is part of Stop Climate Chaos Scotland, lobbying the Scottish Government to put in place a Climate Change bill with targets to reduce carbon emissions significantly. Leaflets from Christian Aid about this are at the back of the church.

There are resources and ideas for encouraging wildlife around church gardens. We already have a dedicated meadow area and there are some things we could do to provide shelter for hedgehogs, bees and insects for example – and indeed plant more seeds and bulbs.

From 1st September to 4th October each year is "Creation Time" and an ecumenical writing group produces resources to focus on the creation theme.

That, and the next Eco-congregation Annual Gathering (in Dundee) with the theme 'Energy' on Saturday 30 March 2019 – are dates for the diary.

Rev. David Coleman, a URC minister and member of the Iona Community, was inducted as the new Environmental Chaplain in September 2018, and the new manager since October 2018 is Stephen Curran. The website is www.ecocongregationscotland.org.

Open Forum

The Open Forum met monthly throughout the year with about 15 participants, who discussed the relation of the Christian faith to the modern world. During the first three months we continued to use a book by Adrian Smith, a Roman Catholic priest, called "Tomorrow's Christian" and talked about a Christian as someone who grows more like Jesus, who is continuously exploring the meaning of faith and who is prepared to take the risk of exploring and restating Christian tradition in new ways.

Between May and August we thought about sin as a failure in love; Judgment as being something happening throughout life rather than at the end of it; the origin and understanding of the Creeds in the light of present knowledge. For October onwards, we selected six topics from a book called "Ethics in the Real World", by an American philosopher named Peter Singer, and are attempting to relate our faith to these: Racism; eating fish; our relationship with and our treatment of the natural world.

From January we shall continue with 'Why vote?'; Doing good and Euthanasia. It should go without saying that anyone who is prepared to think about our faith with an open mind (and anyone who is not!) is welcome to join us on the second Sunday of each month at 9.15 a.m. in the small room at the back of the Hall.

Property Group

1 INTRODUCTION

The congregation through Vestry is responsible for the care and maintenance of the Listed church buildings and the rectory.

The Property Committee's remit is, in broad terms, to plan and implement the maintenance of, and repairs and improvements to, the fabric of our properties. All such work is of course constrained by the annual budget allowance or funding otherwise authorised by Vestry, and by any relevant statutory and Diocesan planning requirements. The Committee's last formal meeting was in May 2015, since when its activities have been undertaken by a small Property Group comprising the convenor, the property manager, and Gavin Wye. Others have been called upon for assistance when needed.

The Property Group's activities have been reported for every vestry meeting. Professional guidance in terms of fulfilling the Quinquennial Survey recommendations and major projects has been provided by David Willis (CLWG Architects). Detailed building condition surveys of the church and rectory buildings fabric, and agreed repair works were undertaken by LBC Building Services. Electrical works have been undertaken by Sentry Electrics, and gas heating works, servicing, and repairs by Thomson Home Services.

Smaller repairs required at short notice may be undertaken by others as necessary (eg joinery, locksmiths, and plumbing work). Other regular checks such as maintenance of the alarms and fire safety equipment are undertaken under annual contracts. Portable appliance testing, and testing of electrical circuitry and lightning conductors are undertaken by contractors when required.

2 SUMMARY OF ACTIONS OVER THE PAST YEAR

- **Health & Safety** No notifiable incidents have been recorded.
- Church/Hall Yard The yard drains and roof gutters required clearing only rarely since the large Cupressus was removed over a year ago.

- Routine servicing and repairs The church intruder and fire alarms and fire extinguishers were serviced under contract. The church and rectory heating apparatus (rectory in April, church and hall in October) were serviced and repairs carried out as required.
- **Lighting** Light bulbs in the corridor and "store" have been replaced with LEDs.
- **Toilets** The basin support in the baby change room was repaired.
- **Kitchen area** A minor infestation of church mice was dealt with.
- **Baptismal font** Frequent visual inspection and manipulation of the mechanism continues. The bowl of the baptismal font was treated to prevent further powdery deterioration of the surface.
- Church and hall roofs. Regular inspections and reporting by Jim Lyster continued and repairs were carried out where necessary to the roof coverings and rainwater goods.
- **Rectory works** Two additional internal smoke alarms have been fitted to comply with landlord regulations and diocesan advice. The electrical circuitry has been tested and certified according to the five-year plan.
- Hall floor No work was undertaken this year, but a further assessment will be made in spring 2019.

- Choir vestry roof Vestry has approved plans for a new roof and cupola, and the architect's proposal has received statutory planning consent. A minor rainwater leakage was repaired. This project is "on hold" for a later time.
- New glazed main entrance to the church This major project was completed satisfactorily, together with associated changes to the organ speakers.
- **Gardeners' store** A new up-and-over door has been fitted.

3 LOOKING FORWARD

The following items are subject to Vestry's agreement and authority to proceed, in additional to any other outstanding statutory and Diocesan consents.

- (a) Space Audit Group "fitness for purpose" outcomes
 This audit of the current uses and abuses of the various
 spaces available within the church and hall buildings (to
 which the property manager contributed) was requested by
 Vestry and was not part of the Property Committee's remit.
- (b) The 2018/19 Quinquennial Survey and Report The next Quinquennial Survey will need to be procured in 2018 for reporting early in 2019. Two tenders have been received, and are being assessed (as at November 2018) before reporting to vestry.
- (c) Other matters to be addressed

- The church garden boundary walls are showing signs of distress in several places due to pressure from tree roots. We are monitoring this situation. The footpath at the west end of the church has been disturbed by root growth; the gardening group have attended to this.
- Lighting upgrades Legislation means that many of the church interior spotlights (GU10 and MR16 halogen type) will need to be replaced with LED equivalents. Technical advice and a cost estimate have been sought (October 2018) and the work is expected to proceed as soon as possible subject to costing.
- A new garden shed for the rectory is being investigated.
- The church bells Groups of bell ringers have visited during this and the previous year. The bells and their supporting frame are reported as basically sound and safe, but if more use is to be expected of this feature of our church, some maintenance work is going to be necessary. Professional advice may be needed. In addition, the access stairway, handrails, and trapdoors will need to be improved.
- **Portable appliance testing** this will be arranged for the coming year.

It has been a privilege to share the challenges, and to have had the input and practical support of so many wonderful and dedicated people.

The all age service on the first Sunday of the month is now very familiar. Since the Autumn we have had the Diocesan Play Church, with the wonderful Fischy Music to welcome it here on a lovely sunny Sunday afternoon! Each week Play Church has been used to give our children more insight into what happens in church and then, of course, to tell us about it. This has been a great success and we hope to make our own version to carry on this work. Youth Alpha continues to meet on the last Sunday of the month and in the course of the year they have tackled a wide range of topics with candour and good humour.

It has also been a great delight to have Baptisms and a Confirmation (shared with Merchiston).

Many thanks to Megan Emmerson and to her helpers for all the hard work behind the scenes in engaging our children and young people. As well as the ongoing Shalom and Open Forum there have been many opportunities to reflect, discuss, and learn. During Lent the Mission Shaped Intro course was led by Annie Naish, and there were additional thoughtful services. In the Autumn was a Praying with the Heart course supported by the Epiphany Group, now a new venture of a weekly group on Wednesdays has arisen from that experience, and, following the Welcoming of the Light on 1 December an Advent group will study An Advent Pilgrimage. The Tuesday Pilgrim course is currently running led by our student Harriet. There was also lots of encouragement to talk at the Grave Talk day in August. Those who attended the St Cuthbert's Lecture enjoyed a most interesting insight into The Apocryphal Gospels.

It is so very heartening to see the different ways in which we are being challenged to think, pray and indeed look to the future not only for ourselves but also for the church. Such ventures do not happen without planning and we must thank all those who have been involved.

We have enjoyed many events, sharing together and eating good food: a Scottish Evening, our wonderful Harvest Festival weekend, the mix of celebration and Remembrance in November; the church on both these occasions was transformed by many, thanks go especially to Margaret Temple and Christine Nimmo for all their work making Remembrance very special this year. During this year on the 2nd of February 2018 I completed 20 years of working with St. Cuthbert's and was delighted to be presented, on Sunday the 18th of March, with a diocesan St. Cuthbert's medal – somehow you managed to keep it secret until the day!

The Thursday Service continues to thrive, and many thanks go to those who help, with lifts, teas, welcoming and

especially music (Donald, Jan & Julian) and those who have taken the service – an ever growing band this year including myself, Nicki, Rolf, Moira Shirreff, Bryan, Joan, Mary McMahon and recently at considerable personal effort Christopher Davies. Thank you all so much and my apologies if I have missed anyone out!

I also took a few Wednesday morning services and had the opportunity to preach on Sunday 11th February, and have taken 2 of the monthly care home services in Cairdean and Thorburn.

During the year Nicki has set up a Pastoral Visiting Group, and recently I had the opportunity to share some material developed in my work with Faith in Older People, on understanding dementia, its cause and effects, and how we as visitors or fellow worshippers come over. The work with Faith in Older People grew out of my ministry here and was both informed and guided by one of your previous Rectors, Malcolm Goldsmith, and I'm glad to have had the chance to share some ideas with the Pastoral Visiting Group.

We are often conscious of the first time we try something in life, but less frequently aware when it may be the final time we do something.
