## John Halliburton Mitchell 1890 – 1917 Captain 17<sup>th</sup> (Service) Battalion, the Royal Scots (Lothian Regiment)

John Halliburton Mitchell, Captain 17<sup>th</sup> (Service) Battalion, the Royal Scots (Lothian Regiment). Second son of James William Mitchell of Fernielaw, Colinton, Rothesay Herald and Lyon Clerk Depute, and his wife Annie, daughter of Thomas Sykes.



He was born at Colinton Mains on 19<sup>th</sup> July 1890. Educated at Cargilfield School, Fettes

College, and the University of Edinburgh, where he joined the O.T.C. March 1909- August 1914, obtaining the rank of Cadet Company Sergeant-Major.

On the outbreak of war he applied for a commission, and was gazetted 2nd Lieutenant, 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion the Royal Scots, 28<sup>th</sup> August 1914, and promoted to Lieutenant and Adjutant 9<sup>th</sup> November 1914. Promoted to Captain 14<sup>th</sup> January 1915, where he remained as an Adjutant of his Battalion. He served with the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force in Gallipoli from 5<sup>th</sup> November 1915, where he contracted enteric fever and was hospitalised in Alexandria, and subsequently invalided home on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1916. Transferred to the 17<sup>th</sup> Battalion and posted to France 18<sup>th</sup> January1917, and took part in the fighting on the Somme.

He died at Provans, near Ypres, 26<sup>th</sup> October 1917, aged 27, following wounds received in action at Houthulst Forest the previous day. He married at St. Cuthbert's on 27<sup>th</sup> September 1917, Helen Dalrymple Maclagan, of Woodthorpe, Colinton.

He is Remembered with Honour at Mendinghem Military Cemetery, Belgium, Fettes School, University of Edinburgh, and Colinton War Memorial
