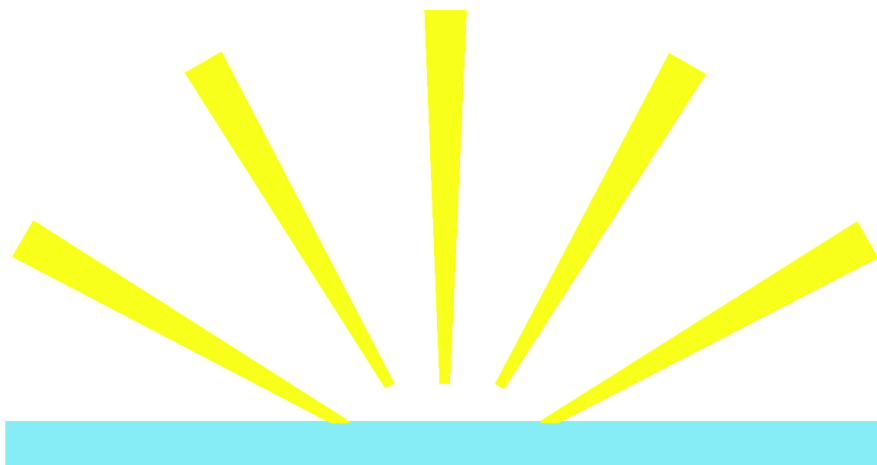

Hear the good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

SERMON

*Please sit*

I wonder how many of us took up new hobbies during the various lockdowns. Cycling, running, mountain climbing? No?! What about playing a guitar, or piano, writing, painting, gardening (that was my effort) or many other things where you can buy what is needed from Mr. Amazon, have it delivered the next day and enthusiastically get on with your new-found love – or not.

I imagine there are many musical instruments, pens and notebooks, paints and gardening equipment now sitting gathering dust. It's all well and good having the interest, the desire, but with most of these hobbies, you have to be taught by someone who knows. No matter how many YouTube videos you watch on the subject, or articles you read on Wikipedia, or even professional sites specifically for learning to play an instrument, paint, or telling you how to identify a real plant from a weed – we all get bored with them and the new-found love is sadly forgotten.

Hopefully though, some have found good teachers on these social platforms and, even if progress is very slow, are persevering, working hard on learning their new skill. Or maybe there was a teacher in their home.

We all need teachers.

And I think in the Gospel reading today, where Jesus is giving us the greatest commandment of all, we also need someone to teach us to do this.

Yes, we all know what it is to love and there certainly are some forms of human love that come close to the love Jesus is guiding us to – self-giving, sacrificial love.

That of a parent to a child is the simplest example. I remember the first time I set eyes on my girls (and my granddaughter). I didn't realise I was capable of loving so much. Nobody needed to teach me that; it was just there; my heart full to bursting, thinking I was responsible for this little human being, so vulnerable and so reliant on me.

Most love, however, is voluntary – even between parents and children as time passes. I'm sure you've all heard the saying, 'you can choose your friends, but you can't choose your family'. Basically, we choose who to love when, and a lot of the time, the love is quite selfish – it's all about what makes us feel good.

In 1960, CS Lewis wrote *'The Four Loves'* which explored the nature of love from a Christian and philosophical perspective.

Where we have one word for love, in Greek there are four words – storge, philia, eros and agape.

Storge is liking someone through the fondness of familiarity – natural, instinctual affection, such as a parent towards their child.

Philia is the love between friends, as close as siblings, in strength and duration. A brotherly/sisterly love bond without the blood link.

Eros is romantic love. The falling in love most dream of as teenagers and we see in romantic or Disney films.

And Agape, unconditional ‘God’ love. The love that exists regardless of changing circumstances.

So, to experience the love that Jesus talks about today; sacrificial agape love, we need a teacher.

Someone who journeys with us, teaching us the basics.

Someone who can teach us how to extend our hearts.

Someone who can tell us when we should speak up and when we should stay quiet.

Someone who can show us that time alone for prayer and reflection is good.

Someone who can show us when sacrificial love is needed and how to give it.

Someone who offers us unconditional love.

We need a teacher who will model for us what it is to live the life that Jesus calls us to. I wonder who that is – who we all have in our lives, as a role model for this perfect, sacrificial love?

As they used to say when I was studying, if you don't know the answer, always say Jesus!

Jesus has shown us how to love in his ministry to the lepers, the sinners, the outcasts. He tells us we should feed the hungry, give water to the thirsty and clothe the naked. Even the Gentiles received the Holy Spirit!

I love that in the reading from 1 John, we are told 'his commandments are not burdensome'. Love really shouldn't be burdensome, and this has been shown during covid – and not only by those professing to be Christian.

From the beginning of the pandemic, people have been helping others, caring for those who live alone, or are vulnerable, keeping an eye on neighbours - and even the homeless were given somewhere safe to stay.

People have been grateful to those who have continued to work, in the NHS, food supply, teaching, delivery drivers, etc. etc. There have been visible signs of gratitude and kindness; clapping, rainbows, painting stones, bell ringing, all for our friends.

Now as things begin to return to normal, whatever that will look like, let's not forget about that kindness, that love.

Let's abide in it, as we abide in God's love. Let's remain a while in a place where all are loved and cared for, in every place and for all time.

Let's continue to go and bear fruit. Amen.

Praise and thanksgiving be to you, Lord of all, for by the Cross, eternal life is ours and death is swallowed up in victory. In the first light of Easter glory broke from the tomb and changed the women's sorrow into joy. From the Garden the mystery dawned that he whom they had loved and lost is with us now in every place for ever.

Making himself known in the breaking of the bread, speaking peace to the fearful disciples, welcoming weary fishermen on the shore, he renewed the promise of his presence and of new birth in the Spirit who sets the seal of freedom on your sons and daughters.

Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release, the night in which slaves walked free, at supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks.

He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying:

"Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you."

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying:

"Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me."

**We recall his blessed passion and death,**

**his glorious resurrection and ascension;**

**and we look for the coming of his Kingdom.**

**Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy living sacrifice.**

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

**Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles and prophets, Saint Cuthbert and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.**

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end. **Amen.**

Bookings can be made: Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday

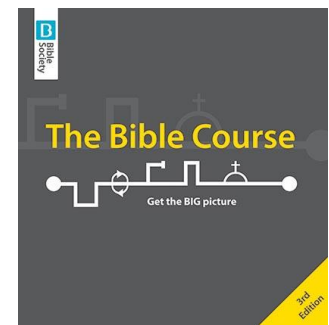
