Alleulia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleulia!

It has been so lovely to celebrate Lent, Holy Week and Easter together in church with our friends and family. A bonus seeing 125 of you on Easter Day. I hope you all managed to get a glass of Prosecco after the 10.30am service – my family’s gift to you from them.

And now, as we continue in the season of Easter, I look forward to a holiday with my family. The first one in over two years, so I hope and pray it all goes to plan!



On Monday of Holy Week I attended the Chrism Mass at our cathedral where all ordained ministers are invited to renew

their vows. Bishop John, during his sermon, spoke of things being passed onto us unfinished, or beginning a task that you have to pass on to someone else when you leave – or die. It spoke to many of us that day and I put some of it here, but you can find the whole sermon on the diocesan website.



Bishop John said:

“Do we also wonder, or at least find others telling us, that all this (*ministry*) is a waste of time and energy, that our bizarre enterprise is doomed to failure, that it is all too much for us? We answer God’s call and find we’re picking up where others have left off, sometimes having to repair damage they’ve caused, and when we leave, long before the job is finished, we wonder whether our contribution,

for all its worth, has done more than scratch the surface of the Great Commission to preach the gospel to all nations or to build the Kingdom of Heaven.

We don't get to make the church according to our own master plan, we don't start with a blank sheet, we get what we're given and hope that our meagre offering, five loaves and two fish or whatever, may turn out to be sufficient. And if we can't control the church, far less can we control the intrusions of the real world, of which we are also a part. Life has a habit of writing our agenda for us. And why not? For, like it or not, this is the life, this is the world in which we've signed up to serve God, the world in which God is incarnate.

Yes, pandemics and climate crises, European wars and spiralling energy costs may well interrupt the smooth flow of church life and spoil our careful planning, but it's precisely here, amongst all this disruption and tragedy, that today's two readings come to life. (*Isaiah 61.1-9; Luke 4.16-21*) Here are the broken-hearted we are called to heal, even as our hearts also break, here are the captives we are asked to liberate, even though we too find ourselves imprisoned by our own limitations. The task of rebuilding always calls us out beyond ourselves, the task of ministry calls us out beyond the confining walls of church to offer sustenance to others on the pilgrim way and to walk alongside them to realise Isaiah's vision of a God with special compassion for the weakest and most oppressed; of a longed-for world where all shall know peace, joy, justice and where ruined cities (a poignant image this) are rebuilt. To affirm the strange and wonderful paradox that, with all its terrors and uncertainties, this year too is the year of the Lord's favour, this year too is God's good news to us.

History, Western history at any rate, has its cycles, its changes of mood. Edwardian optimism shattered first by the slaughter of the

trenches then by the horror of the gas chambers. Post-war confidence of the 1960s, the end of the Cold War, the end of apartheid, slowly crumbling as 9/11 and the fear of difference brings us to a new age of demagogues and Putin's war in Ukraine. We find these moods reflected in Christian theology too – reflected in our own convictions.

Yet, our faith requires us to be neither utopian nor nihilistic – to believe not in the perfectibility of humanity but in the goodness of God, not in the ultimate destruction of all things, but in the promise of God's transforming mercy. And we endure, not because we can see the end or because we have any evidence to support us other than the apparently futile and obscure death of a young Nazarean who told us he had good news for the poor. That, and the stubbornly persistent belief that ultimately God's purposes will win through for us as they did for that young man. That our apparently pointless adventure has meaning.

Perhaps we are batty to keep on doing all this until we die in service and pass it all on to someone else to make sense of. But our commitment to ministry which we renew today is an expression of our trust that, even when the evidence says otherwise, the future is God's and that one day the work of rebuilding will be complete."

He ended with these words from Bishop Ken Untener, in celebration of departed priests:

'It helps, now and then, to step back and take the long view. The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts; it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is another way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about. We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water the seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something and to do it well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.' Amen.

## Covid Regulations Update

When receiving Communion, the wafer will be dipped into the wine by the person leading the Eucharist, before passing it to you. If you would prefer to receive the wafer only, with no wine, please let the worship leader know when you come to the altar rail.

The choir is allowed to sing without masks (but may choose not to).

We continue to use hand gel when entering and leaving church and when coming to the altar.


We encourage you to continue to wear face coverings, unless you are exempt.

From 1 May, we will no longer record who attends services. If we are notified that someone has attended a service during their infectious period, a 'warn and inform' email will be sent out to all members of the congregation.

## May News from the NSM



He is risen. What wonderful words these are. The hope that has fuelled us through Lent and Holy Week has ultimately been realized in the joy and salvation of Easter. And we now move forward, spurred on by this joy to await the promised gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

This new life embedded in our hearts and minds is reflected in the new life we see all around us in God's creation, the trees gradually putting on their mantles of green leaves, an increasingly colourful array of flowers bursting forth, birds building nests and bees hungrily seeking pollen. As I write this on a bright but chilly April morning, I am looking forward to bathing in such pleasures in my eagerly anticipated return visit at the beginning of May to the wonderful Aigas Field Centre up in the Highlands, which so inspired me last July.

Like many of us, I'm keen to resume holidays, denied to most of us during the many stages of the pandemic, but I can't help holding my breath in case my trip to Aigas is cancelled, like my short retreat in March, cancelled due to Covid at the Retreat Centre. However, how can I and the rest of us not feel utterly grateful for the undeserved and glorious benefits we enjoy daily, some of which inspired me a couple of weeks ago to write some verses of very bad modern poetry, including these lines –

***Today my soul was uplifted by the glorious sounds of birdsong  
And the joy of the emerging palette of colour in the garden,  
Transforming this small suburban patch into a mini paradise.....***

But not everyone in our troubled world can share this joy. On the first Thursday afternoon of April, twenty five members of St. Cuthbert's and St. Fillan's experienced a service entitled 'Journey to the Cross', led by myself, Joan and Caroline. As we followed the suffering Jesus on his own journey to the cross, the loan of a beautiful, quilted hanging in the colours of the Ukraine flag reminded us that we are called to walk in prayer with the suffering in this world, who do not share our privileges or live in an atmosphere of peace.

May our prayers and those of so many others, plus all the practical help, the donations of time, action, money or necessary goods pouring into Ukraine and other trouble spots across the globe, demonstrate that God's work of love, compassion and caring is very much alive in this world, ready to combat the evil working through those for whom power, greed, selfishness and contempt for others appears paramount.

One of the most brilliant of flowers adorning fields across the world, and especially in Ukraine, is the sunflower, a symbol of hope. May this symbol shine in our hearts as we pray that all God's children, all humankind, may come to know the joy and salvation brought to us at Easter by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

## Eco Congregation

In our efforts to achieve the silver award and also consider the church's statement of being carbon neutral by 2030, we are now looking at items we use in church that will help us in this endeavour.

Marie has already changed to 'Eco-Logical' white printer paper for the orders of services, pew notices and general printing. The paper, and it's packaging is 100% recyclable. Find out more at [www.navigator-paper.com](http://www.navigator-paper.com) (and if you would like a code to enable you plant a tree in your name, please just ask Marie as a code is received with every order).

This month we will begin to use toilet paper produced by naked sprout.

Naked sprout uses bamboo unbleached toilet paper. Bamboo requires no pesticides or fertilisers and only needs rainwater to grow. Bamboo absorbs 5 times more carbon dioxide than trees and produces 35% more oxygen than trees. It is naturally the fastest growing plant in the world and rapidly renewable. Growing up to 3 feet in 24 hours and reaching maturity within 4-6 years - trees take 30-60 years. The bamboo we use is different to the type that pandas eat!

Carbon emissions from producing our bamboo toilet rolls are 30% lower than recycled and 65% lower than non-recycled toilet roll.

Think if there is anything you can do at home to help too.





## Jessica Mwedzi smiles with love for her children as she stirs a single bowl of porridge for them...

...But she knows they're hungry for more. This one bowl of porridge is all she and her family can eat today. 'My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. We often go to bed on an empty stomach. It pains me to send them to bed hungry.'

**For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival.**

Like many women in rural Zimbabwe (7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food), she toils on her farm, but nothing can grow on her ashen, dry land. **Drought starves.** Intensified by the climate crisis, and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger.

'One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.'

## Turn hunger into hope

It's unjust that drought, exacerbated by the effects of conflict and the global pandemic, robs Jessica of the power to provide for her family. Her husband is unwell, so she's the only breadwinner. Her children look to her, but she has nothing left to give.

Yet she is anything but helpless. In the face of drought, her love for her family gives her courage to stand strong - and we stand with her. She says, 'My children give me the power to go ahead... I pray they have a better future.'

In Zimbabwe the climate crisis is causing aching hunger for families like Jessica's. The combined effect of the Covid-19 pandemic, conflict and drought have robbed her of the power to provide for her children. And 7,000 miles away the war in Ukraine will drive up food prices in Zimbabwe and around the globe. Without the fertiliser and food, such as wheat and sunflower oil, which Ukraine and Russia produce, vulnerable families will be pushed even deeper into hunger.

## **But hope does not disappoint. Hope lives in you.**

Your gift could help Jessica set up water taps on her farm, learn to grow food and provide seeds that thrive in drought, giving her all she needs to turn her dry, dusty land into a garden of hope.

With every gift, every action, every prayer, we celebrate and share hope with our brothers and sisters facing crisis around the world, from Ukraine to Zimbabwe.

During Christian Aid Week 15<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup> May you might receive an envelope through your door. If not, there will be some available in Church on both 15<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup>.
