VESTRY REPORT - December 2025



- Three members of Vestry attended the training day on the 15th of November at Haddington.
- The yearly Financial Report and Accounts for 2025 have been signed.
- We have always given Christmas vouchers to all staff (Marie, Philip, Julia (not Nicki)) and also Margaret, Cletus, and Megan. Heather had sent suggestions for this year: amounting to £250 in total. These were approved by Vestry.
- Changes in the PVG system makes it against the law not to have a PVG for regulated work, as well as being against the law to hold a PVG when not doing regulated work. Christine and Nicki are in the process of checking our list.
- Nicki has updated the Vestry folder. There have been many changes to documents over the last year.
- Nicki explained that she does a lot of tasks that other people should know how to do so that during a vacancy, St Cuthbert's can continue to thrive. Nicki plans that during her last 3 ½ years she will hand out responsibilities for 6-12 months at a time so that Vestry members during this time will know what has to be done.
- Initially, Nicki has suggested the following breakdown of responsibilities amongst the current Vestry. Nicki will help and advise as needed. Nicki will meet people individually to go through the roles allocated:
 - Property:** Kaye, George, Ian.
 - Constitution:** Jayne
 - Rotas:** Megan, Christine
 - Risk assessments and Risk Register:** Esther, Jean
 - Health and Safety:** Judith, Mandy
 - Vestry Folders:** Julia

Finance: Heather, Bryan, Andrew, -it is important that we show that we can afford a Rector when Nicki retires which will mean not having a yearly deficit.

Pastoral Visitors: Hilary

Christmas Tree: Mandy

Hall users: everyone to help

- Nicki, in preparation for her retirement, has put together a Mission Action Plan (MAP) for the next four years. Nicki asked Vestry to read this whilst thinking and praying, over the next month and to write down any ideas/changes they think are necessary to work towards a good vacancy.
- The Rectory boilers have been serviced and further work on these is needed. A quote for the service and parts of £1100.65 has been submitted and Heather and Vestry has approved this to go ahead.
- A leak has been noticed in the choir vestry skylight. It has been inspected and work recommended and we are waiting for quotes.
- Trustee Training: Nicki reminded Vestry that they should renew their training every three years. The dates for 2026 are: 25th April (Edinburgh), 24th October (Borders). Our own Vestry training day is the afternoon of March 7th with Jane McLaren. Vestry agreed that they would be interested in an early meal at Osteria afterwards at their own cost.
- We have had lights on a tree outside for some years but the tree this year kept getting blown over and had to be brought inside. From next year we won't have an external tree.
- Volunteers were needed for welcomers at Midnight mass and the 28th of December and a Reader for Christmas Day. George and June, Julia and Kay offered to fill the first two roles respectively.

- Nine Lessons- Porteous have offered some financial support for refreshments (amount unknown). Megan and Kate have offered to help at the Crib service. Other helpers needed. The collection is for Aberlour.
- Vestry was reminded about Carols at the Colinton Inn. Amy has suggested that any collection go to the church this year.
- Nicki will celebrate and preach at Midnight Mass and Christmas Day.
- The Ukrainians will have Midnight Mass in Church on January 6th. The week of prayer for Christian Unity will begin with a lunch with the Ukrainians is on 17th January at 1pm and will be a ticketed event with donations asked for.
- Nicki has been covering Falkirk Church, as well as some of the services that Margaret would normally take, and deaths and three funerals before Christmas, has resulted in her needing to ask permission to carry over 2 Sundays and 5 days annual leave into 2026. Vestry agreed.

Message for February from Revd Margaret.

It feels very strange to be writing about a month that, with increasing daylight, should be heralding a hope of warmth to come, when I am sitting indoors wrapped up cosily with snow falling outside. A new year has just begun and, following tradition, many of us have made New Years resolutions to shake off sluggish minds and bodies after the over excesses, though happy delights, of the festive period.

But this Christmas and New Year have been very different and difficult for me, having so recently lost my dearly loved husband. It has caused me to reflect on the fact that, as we get older, many of us at this joyous time have had to face recent bereavement, or a painful increase in illness of our own or those dear to us, or reminders of early winter losses of beloved family members in years past.

However, further reflection has intensified my belief that God is with us always, and that this is perhaps even more evident in the painful and wearying times than in the good ones. As the writer of Hebrews informs us, God reaches out to us, saying: 'I will never leave you or forsake you.' And, as the secular, reflective author Donna Ashworth writes: 'When your body won't continue and your soul just needs a break don't forget I'm always here.'

Indeed, support appears from unexpected sources and moments occur when joy really does reappear and knock at the door of your soul, the dear friend who goes the extra

mile for you, a granddaughter gives you some exciting news, or perhaps even more fleeting happenings. I experienced such a moment earlier this week when a pair of bullfinches returned to my bird feeder after months of absence.

Indeed, hope, support and comfort **are** there, nudging at us, reminding us of happy memories with loved ones or times of meaningful celebration. For me, one source of such hope, of light shining in the darkness, occurs on the 2nd February each year, the celebration of Candlemas, the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. So, please join us for our Thursday afternoon service on the 5th February, when my chosen theme for the occasion is Candlemas in Poetry and Art. I will ponder the joy engendered in that presentation, Christ the light of the world, the use of candles and finally snowdrops, Candlemas Bells, symbolising hope, purity and the turning of winter's darkness into light. I have very happy memories of visiting the display at Cambo Estate with Ian, the little white flowers lighting up a day of gloomy weather.

The Package of Christmas

In the quiet memory of Christmas,
I return to a humble place—
a manger, not a palace,
where heaven chose simplicity.
There, Jesus was born low to the ground,
close enough for the poor to touch,
gentle enough for the rich to kneel.
In His humility, I learned
that no one is too small to be loved,
and no one too great to need grace.

Around me, lights danced on walls and trees,

February 2026 Music Notes



It seems strange to be penning a music article for the February edition of *The Sign*, taking us into Lent, before the season of Christmas has fully ended! The anthems which the choir hopes to sing closely follow the theme of each Sunday. February opens with our observation of The Presentation of Christ in the Temple / Candlemas, and so we will sing a setting of the Nunc Dimittis, the words of Simeon in the Temple in Jerusalem from Luke 2, which we usually hear at Evensong. The text of our anthem the following Sunday is taken from Psalm 86, set to the music by William Crotch (1775 – 1847), who was organist of Christ Church, Oxford, and subsequently Professor of Music at Oxford University. We then observe the Feast of the Transfiguration, with a setting of words on this theme to a magnificent Lutheran Chorale, harmonized by JS Bach. And finally, our first anthem of the penitential Lenten season is a setting of words from 1 Kings, Chapter 8, by Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810 – 1876), grandson of hymn writer Charles Wesley, and great nephew of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. SS Wesley was one of the towering figures of English cathedral music, occupying in turn a number of prestigious posts, and was responsible for a restoration of musical standards in England's cathedrals.

Lastly, I would like to express my thanks to all who sang at our excellent carol service, at the carol-singing in the Colinton Inn and at our services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day – your contributions were greatly appreciated.



TLM's Vision: "Leprosy Defeated, Lives Transformed".

TLM's Global Fellowship is made up of 27 countries, with TLM teams, 13 working directly with persons affected by leprosy and the remaining 14 from Europe, Australia and New Zealand to raise funds for the fight to end leprosy.

The new **ASK Prayer Diary** for 2026 is a way of joining the Fellowship in prayer, week by week, with information and news from around the world. Please let Kay know if you would like a copy – a reference copy is at the back of the church.

For 5-11 January prayers are focused on Myanmar: for peaceful solutions to the challenges of more than 3.5 million internally displaced people and the devastation of the earthquake in March 2025; for Internally Displaced People, especially those affected by increased bombings amidst their shelters and worsening humanitarian needs; for the safety, health and wellbeing of all staff and volunteers.

For 12-18 January there are prayer points for the team in Britain who meet every morning to seek God's leading in their work. They pray for people affected by leprosy, their faithful supporters and volunteers, and their colleagues overseas. They work to raise awareness and pray that they can touch hearts through the stories of people affected by the disease.

World Leprosy Day Sunday 25 January I suggest we make that the focus of a collection. Steven McLeish the TLM representative in Scotland can hopefully come to talk to us in the near future at a service. Over the Christmas period he shared from TLM the story of Nisha, a young girl in India who lost her step-mother to leprosy, and then was herself diagnosed with the disease. The Leprosy Mission hospital at Champa treated her, but when she returned home the stigma remained and she cannot go to school in her village.

At the beginning of a new year it seems right to pray for children affected by leprosy, and do what we can to make it a reality that every child like Nisha is free to grow, play and hope without fear.

Hi! How are we after the fancy cooking of Christmas and Hogmanay? Still craving a 'little something' that's not chocolate, not difficult, satisfies a good mouthfeel, and is an Happy Food?

If you don't have soured milk, use buttermilk instead. Alternatively, you can add 1tbsp lemon juice to the same quantity of whole milk and leave to stand for 10min before using.

Sweet soda bread

8 servings

Prep Time: 15 mins

Cook Time: 35 mins

Ingredients

200 g plain flour

200 g plain wholemeal flour, plus extra to dust

2 tsp. bicarbonate of soda

75 g butter, chilled and cubed

40 g porridge oats

75 g raisins or sultanas

75 g dates, finely chopped

250 ml soured milk, plus extra to brush,

3 Tbsp. runny honey

1/2 Tbsp. demerara sugar

Method

Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan) mark 6 and line a baking sheet with baking parchment. In a large bowl mix the flours, bicarbonate of soda and 1/2tsp fine salt. Add the butter and rub in using your fingers until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Mix in the oats and dried fruit. In a jug, mix the soured milk and honey, until combined. Add to the dry ingredients and stir to make a soft dough. Tip on to a work surface and shape to a rough 7" round (try not to overwork the dough or the soda bread may become tough).

Transfer to the lined sheet. Using a knife or the handle of a wooden spoon, slice/press a deep cross into the top of the loaf. Brush the top with soured milk, then sprinkle over the demerara sugar.

Bake for 30-35min, or until slightly risen and deep golden and sounds hollow when tapped.

Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely before serving in slices.


