Dear Friends,

Alleluia, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia! Yes, it is still Easter and will continue to be so until we reach Pentecost later in May. I love the season of Easter; colours change, and hope abounds in the life eternal, as we



hear the post resurrection stories. I wonder how we would have reacted if we had been there to witness these things?

It was so lovely to see a full congregation for our Easter celebrations at 10.30am, made even more special with the baptism of Annabelle. I hope you all continued to celebrate the day when you returned home. I certainly did with my family, but I must confess I fell asleep at some point in the afternoon. Having a dawn service at 6.30am when the clocks went back did not help. It was still a very special service, lighting the fire and listening to the birds, with thanks to all those who attended. My thanks also to everyone who made the church look so beautiful for the day (and following weeks).

At the end of the month, we return to the long season of green – Pentecost. It's hard to believe that Pentecost takes us up to Advent, as even without thinking about that, the year is already flying by.

I am getting nearer to the start of my sabbatical, which begins on August 1^{st,} and I will return to church on November 3rd. During that period, Revd Margaret will take two Sunday 10.30am services a month and most Wednesday services. Other services will be covered by visiting priests. Sunday 8.30am services will have two services a month with Reserved Sacrament (when Revd Margaret is leading the 10.30am). These will be led by Joan Smith and David Ferro, and the visiting priest on the other 10.30am Sundays will also take the 8.30am service. Pastoral care will be given by Revd Tim Tunley. If you have a pastoral emergency during this time and need to see a priest, Tim's number will be in the magazine from August. If you would like a visit from a pastoral visitor while I am away, please contact Hilary Pritchard, who will be coordinating the team.

I am learning that having a sabbatical is not an easy thing to do, as there is so much planning and preparation involved to make sure everything is covered while I am away.

I am sorry to let you know that Martin Fairley and Robin Holmes have both decided to retire from their roles from the end of our financial year (August 31). Martin has been treasurer for nearly ten years (this time) and I believe Robin has been doing the bookkeeping for nearer twenty years. I would like to say how grateful I am to them both for their work, support and guidance in the seven years I have been at St. Cuthbert's. Thank you gents!

There is more information about both roles following this. It would be good to fill the posts from within the congregation but along with a number of other churches in the diocese who cannot fill the posts, there is also an option to pay for an external treasurer and bookkeeper.

The Fundraising and Events Team continue to keep busy. In April we had a lovely afternoon tea, this month we have the walking

challenge to get us all out and about, as well as the first of the 'soup and social' lunches they have planned throughout the year. There is a break during June as they prepare for the Welcome Weekend in July. Lots more details to follow but some information will follow in this magazine.

Other amazing fundraising happening within our St. Cuthbert's family is also highlighted later in the magazine. If you are able to support either, or both, Thomas and Emma, they would be very grateful.

Thoughts for May from the NSM.

INVITATIONS. How we love receiving invitations – to visit family or friends, to meet them for a cuppa or a meal, to go to a concert, the theatre, the cinema or head out into the country for a walk. Of course, invitations are sent out over the winter, but many of us as we get older feel all too happy to 'coorie doon' during the grey, dismal, damp and chilly weather, but now, with the light extending and increasing warmth, invitations to all these pleasures become more welcome and diaries start to fill up with opportunities for fellowship. We have excellent examples in our own church community, as the Phoenix Group offer us a visit to Rosslyn Chapel and a ride on the canal from Ratho during the coming months.

As with all invitations, those issuing them long for us to say 'yes!' But do **we** also take the initiative? Do **we** contact family and friends and invite them to join us for a pleasurable time together? It's especially important when we know that those we'd love to see are shy, anxious or lacking in organisational gifts, so it's up to us in such cases to get in touch and make the plans.

As Christians we find numerous examples in the Gospels of Jesus issuing invitations for hospitality or reaching out in welcome to others, from overt examples like the feeding of the 5,000 to the beautiful, more general welcome found in Matthew's Gospel: 'Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you.' But I am now going to issue you with a very **personal** invitation on behalf of myself, Joan and Caroline, to join us for our monthly Thursday afternoon services. These are very different from our normal liturgical services, offering an opportunity to delve into a particular theme through the medium of readings, prayers, hymns and reflections. The theme changes each month and everyone who comes gets the chance to join in the prayers and the hymns. Perhaps some of you would like to be more involved, for example compose a

prayer for the theme, or read one of the chosen passages – the possibilities are endless. And, of course, there's the hospitality - an essential part of any Christian gathering tea, biscuits and fellowship afterwards in the hall, and help with serving these refreshments is another way you could become involved.



I will be leading the service on May 2nd, looking into the topic of Rogation Days – What Are They? It's a fascinating and in fact important part of our liturgical season, leading up to the celebration of Ascension Day. So, please do come along and join us. We're looking forward to seeing you, and if you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask one of us. In the meantime, my love and blessings for this Spring season.





MAY 2024 Music Notes



Those who read my article in the April edition of *The Sign* might have spotted some evidence that it was written quite some time before the publication date. In it, I referred to the wonderful annual television broadcast on Holy Saturday from the chapel of King's College, Cambridge, of music for Holy Week and Easter. Having been part of the BBC's Easter offering since 2010, this year it was sadly dropped from the schedule.

However, there was a short but remarkable series of three programmes over the Easter weekend to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the first performance of Bach's St John Passion, which is, to my mind, a much under-rated work in comparison to his more famous St Matthew Passion. The programmes featured a new project by the inspirational choir trainer Gareth Malone (of the Military Wives' Choir fame and other such projects), who wished to bring the work to the attention of a new audience and to show that, three centuries after its composition, it still has power and resonance today. For the performance, he auditioned singers with no experience of such music, eventually selecting a diverse group of eight, which he then worked with to prepare them to sing the St John Passion alongside the BBC Singers, top rank soloists, and the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, in a performance in Cardiff. In the first two programmes, it was remarkable to see what Malone was able to achieve with his fledgling singers, and the effect that the powerful music had on them. The culmination was the performance, shown on Easter Sunday evening, which was quite

remarkable. It really did demonstrate the power of Bach's music, and the impact it can still exert on those who perform it and hear it, even if they have previously had no experience of such music. For those who are interested in choral music, these programmes are really worth watching on 'catch up' television.

The month of May this year includes the Ascension, Pentecost and Trinity Sundays, which is reflected in the selection of anthems detailed below. I am most grateful to Andrew Matheson for deputizing for me at the organ on the 19th and 26th, when I am away on holiday, and again on 23 June, when I plan to be in Suffolk, attending some concerts at the Aldeburgh Festival.

2 Boats with the Seagull Trust for another Round Trip on the Canal from 11am to 2.30 pm on Tuesday 2 July.


The trip was most enjoyable last year. Again, further details will be given nearer the time.

One of the projects is in India where the MUZAFFARPUR HOSPITAL is in great need of rebuilding. Each day, hundreds of people visit the Outpatient Department asking for help. This hospital is a sanctuary for people suffering from leprosy. There are dedicated doctors and nurses who give free care to anyone who needs treatment.

One such woman, Munner, walked for hours to reach the hospital and then had to wait in a long queue to be seen. Her worst fears were confirmed when the doctor told her she had leprosy. She was given the treatment she needed. However, she had come too late to prevent her loss of feeling in her feet and hands. Munner also had her cataracts removed so that she could see clearly again. She knows that she can return to the hospital if she needs extra care at any time in the future.

The MUZAFFARPUR HOSPITAL is just one example of the many projects TLM is needing financial help. Our donations will be gratefully received.

In May, I am going to Malawi for a month to volunteer with 'World Medical Fund', a small charity which was set up by 2 ex-NHS doctors in 1998. They do community outreach clinics for children in rural parts of Malawi. Their concept of mobile clinics was pioneered in 2003 and

was so successful that it now has been copied throughout sub–Saharan Africa. These clinics provide children with lifesaving medical care which they normally wouldn't have access to, and which prevents them from suffering and dying.

Well over 25,000 children are treated each year. In February Nkhotakota, the area where the charity is based, suffered from huge flooding which made around 12.000 people homeless and increased the need for help. I and 2 other medical students will participate in the mobile clinics. The recent floods have made these clinics more challenging, and we have been told to prepare ourselves to travel by boat to reach these communities.

This charity relies entirely on donations and in their effort to keep administrative costs low, don't employ fund-raisers which means 95% of all monies received will be used to improve these communities and will have a big impact. Any donations will be greatly appreciated.

Brrrrr!

If you are still feeling the winter chill of those winds, and the full face lashings of the downpours (April showers?) then you will understand why I'm posting this 'Winter Warmer in front of the Fire' recipe for May...! Ne'er cast a clout

This is such a doddle of a recipe, and the result is so much better than how you remember it as a youngster. It keeps very well, improving with age, (like me of course). Spread with butter, or plop a good slice in a bowl of custard for a pud. Desirous Indeedy...

Dark Jamaican Ginger Loaf Cake

INGREDIENTS

175g plain flour, sifted
1 level tablespoon ground ginger
1 level dessertspoon ground cinnamon
¼ nutmeg, grated - yes it looks like lots when grated...
½ level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
75g black treacle
75g golden syrup
75g dark brown soft sugar
75g butter
1 large egg, lightly beaten with 2 tablespoons of milk
ADDITIONAL
Pre-heat the oven to 170C, gas mark 3
EQUIPMENT
You will need a standard 2lb loaf tin) lined with a 2lb loaf tin liner (no washing up!)

METHOD

Begin by placing the tin of black treacle (without a lid) in a saucepan of barely simmering water to warm it and make it easier to measure.

If you are using a tin of syrup, then pop that in too, otherwise I think there are squeezy bottles these days... Sift the flour and spices into a large bowl.

Now measure the black treacle, golden syrup, sugar and butter into a saucepan with 75ml of water, heat on low and gently stir until thoroughly melted and blended – it won't take long - and remove from the heat.

Next add the syrup mixture to the flour and spices and bicarbonate, beating vigorously with a wooden spoon, (or mixer) and when the mixture is smooth, beat in the egg a little at a time, followed by the bicarbonate of soda and milk.

Now pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake <u>on a</u> <u>lower shelf</u> for $1\frac{1}{4}-1\frac{1}{2}$ hours until it's well-risen and firm to the touch.

Remove the cake from the oven and allow to cool in the tin for 5 minutes before turning out.

If possible, store it in a cake tin, still in its lining, for 24 hours before eating!

With any luck, we shall be thinking salads for our next recipe!



The Secret Baker



In Burundi, malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population, making survival a daily struggle. Jobs and food are hard to come by, and those who have homes often have no electricity or running water. For Aline life was a constant struggle. She was married young and gave birth to her eldest son, Fisto, when she was just 14 years old. She experienced constant abuse at the hands of her violent husband.

Then her husband married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children. Hungry, scorned and alone, she took her first step towards her new life. She participated in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by Christian Aid, which taught her how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. "I came out with amazing knowledge and skills. The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me."

Aline started trading avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she bought a bicycle so she could transport greater quantities of goods to markets further afield. Eventually, her hard work finally paid off: she had earned the money she needed to rent a house.



Once she had a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her. They told her that their father had abused them and had sent their three young siblings to live with different members of his family. Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land in a remote village. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home, in every sense, for her children. She can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their homework by electric light. She still hopes that she'll be reunited with her youngest children in time.

Of course, Burundi continues to be one of the toughest places on earth to live. The future is uncertain and challenges wait for families around every corner. When a ferocious storm destroyed Aline's home, almost killing her and her children, she was able to recover by selling the cows she'd been keeping. Now when crisis threatens her family's survival, she has options. Even a small business can provide just enough resilience to weather the most brutal of storms.

Aline's long and difficult journey out of extreme poverty began with Christian Aid supporters like you.


'When we see Christian Aid, we feel comforted; we feel we are not alone. You helped us to change our poor living conditions. I really thank you from the very bottom of my heart.'


