

Thank you to everyone who supported Eira (my granddaughter) in her fundraising efforts for SSAFA. She completed the 5 mile Kilt Walk with ease and ended up raising just over £400. In total, £1.6million was raised for 800 charities. What a wonderful event.

In October Bishop Bob will be celebrating his final Eucharist before retiring fully on October 12th.

We will welcome Peter Fitzgerald from Mission to Seafarers to preach on Sunday 19th. He is a little concerned that the

10 minute preaching slot won't be long enough, so please make sure you chat with him afterwards to find out more. We will have a retiring collection for Mission to Seafarers on the day.

November 2nd we will celebrate All Souls. If you would like somebody remembered during the 10.30am service, please print their names on the list at the back of church.

Some of our Ukrainian friends have been applying for humanitarian protection for themselves and their children recently, which sadly has been refused. They have been given fourteen days to appeal. A time of distress and worry, particularly for the children who don't fully understand but truly believe they will be sent back to Ukraine to be killed. I really cannot imagine what they are going through, but it certainly breaks my heart and makes me appreciate how blessed we are, living safely in Scotland. Please keep them in your prayers at this time.

VESTRY REPORT - September 2025

• Reserves Policy- Vestry approved the new Reserves Policy for 2025-2026 as presented by Heather.



- Heather now has full access to the church bank account and documentation has been found so that income from early in 2025 has now been reallocated to the appropriate locations in the accounts.
- Heather had sent Vestry a copy of the simplified Actual vs Budget for the 2024-2025 accounts and proposed Budgets for the next two years. The Actual income was £7262.75 more than the Budget despite standing orders being down by three regular donations. The majority of the increase was from Hall Rental and Regular Annual donations. Thanks were expressed to Marie for her hard work securing Hall rentals. Expenditure was £67,182.00 above budget with the majority of this is due to Property Repairs which included the Floodlights outside, Sound System, Vestry Renovation, Hall Renovations, Preparation and deposit for the Rectory kitchen. Minor amendments were made to the sum in the proposed budgets for property repairs and they were approved by Vestry.
- Vestry approved the extra expenditure of £6900 inc. Vat to Inspire Carpentry to redecorate and make good the area around the new Rectory kitchen. This work was expected when Vestry agreed the updating of the Rectory kitchen could go ahead. This takes the total cost including repairs and insulation under the window and to the back door (previously Minuted)plus the cost of the actual kitchen, to £28,500.
- A large sum has been given to cover the rent for Cletus for 1 year. This is being held in a custodial holding account as is another donation of £1000 for his travel and these will be used as required. Nicki proposed that we use some of our annual local charitable donation to fund a small monthly allowance of £55, (£660 per year) to add to a £20 monthly donation from a member of the congregation. Vestry agreed to this.
- Heather and Vestry have agreed that if we should get a curate in the coming year, the costs will be covered by withdrawing some of our funds provided by the Heather Cottage sale, as detailed in our reserves policy.
- The request for support (£330) from the Diocesan Office for Nicki to attend this year's Clergy Conference in Pitlochry was approved by Vestry.

- AGM-Two members of Vestry need to stand down according to our constitution. No members have served 3 years and so we need two people who have served two years to stand down. Frances and Susan have now volunteered to do this This will give us a possible 5 vacancies going into the AGM. As usual we will ask for questions to be submitted beforehand. Any questions on the day we will record and try to answer in the days following the meeting.
- Julia requested that we buy a new doormat for the hall porch to collect wet and dirt and protect the hall floor. Vestry approved this.
- It was noted that no hot water is available in the Gent's toilet. Nicki will ask Ross to have a look or a plumber if needed.
- The Rectory Kitchen has been delivered, and fitting starts next Monday.
- Heather informed us that a Smart Meter has now been fitted which provides half hourly readings. We have been advised that this increases our use of green source energy.
- Nicki reminded Vestry to always reply to emails from Marie even if they are unable to help. Marie needs support in opening and closing up for some hall bookings as she should not have to come in at weekends to do this. Nicki has asked Marie to put a note in the pew sheets to ask if anybody outside of Vestry is also able to go on a standby list to help with this.
- Nicki requested that if Vestry are able to help tidy away chairs and tables after coffee on a Sunday, please do so. The ladies in the kitchen are not all able to do this. Please encourage other capable people to help too.
- Events Nicki asked Vestry to please attend and support the organisers.
- Kay has received possible dates for the new local representative for the Leprosy Mission (Steven McLeish) to come and talk in church. She will see if 30th November is convenient.
- Andrew told us that there is to be an extra General Synod Zoom meeting to ratify changes to the canons on the election of a Bishop.
- Kay offered to write a report for The Sign on the recent Net Zero meeting that she and Nicki attended.

Message for October from Revd Margaret.

October already! As I thought about this time of year two particular occurrences sprang to mind – Harvest and Autumn, with their associated qualities of gratitude and reflection.

Harvest and gratitude always seem to go together. Our familiar Harvest hymns emphasise this – 'Come ye thankful people come' and 'thank the Lord, O thank the Lord...' Also, some very simple words I found in a Wild Goose Publication likewise stressed this reaction to Harvest: 'This is a feast for all to share, filling our hearts with gratitude for God's incessant love and care.'

However, these simple words made me pause and reflect further on this festival. Firstly, how remote the vast majority of us are from the actual production of the fruits, grains and livestock which provide the food we eat. We just visit a store or order online, our purses adequately furnished with the necessary funds. With favourable conditions a harvest for those working the land will be good. But climate change, adverse soil conditions and scarce financial resources conspire against the less fortunate across the globe, and so we are reminded to reach out in love and compassion and share our own good fortune. As my quote stated, Harvest is a feast for all to share.

Then Autumn: as the year slips rapidly into autumn this month, with its accompanying pleasure of rich colours in trees and shrubs, it too is a time for us to pause and reflect,

this time on what the season might mean for us as we examine our souls and our emotions. Again I was inspired by the Wild Goose publication to ponder over two possible, and inherently symbolic interpretations of the trees gradually being stripped bare of their leaves as winter approaches. The first thought centres around the fact that the stripping bare is a preparation for inner growth, a chance to appreciate the strength that is hidden underneath. And secondly, there's a call for acceptance of the changing seasons because everything, nature, ourselves, our souls and emotions, are safely in God's hands.

The falling of leaves as they age reminds me of our own ageing, which appropriately leads me to the fascinating subject of our October Thursday service, 'Old Age in the Bible.' Please do join us and enjoy fellowship and refreshments afterwards.

May you all enjoy the celebration of the Harvest Festival and the glowing colours of Autumn, not forgetting to reflect over sharing the feast and letting our souls and emotions this season rest safely in God's hands.

Holy Trinity Crisis Foodbank News and Update

Recently Fiona Watson sent me a copy of the latest **Holy Trinity Crisis Foodbank News and Update.** Below are some extracts from it:



"In the first 6 months of 2025:

11,400 Meals for adults given 6,282 Meals for children given 17,682 Meals in total given 586 Instances of a household supported

939 Instances of an adult supported" 499 Instances of a child supported"

"100% of donations of money received in the Crisis Foodbank are spent on food.

The price of food is rising (4.9% in the year to July).

This makes our clients' budgets even tighter, this pushes the Crisis Foodbank's costs up too.

We've been so pleased to be able to provide increasing levels of fresh foods – through some limited term specific donations, and opportunistic access to supermarket excess. These have been very well received"

"We couldn't do any of this without our supporters – the people who pray for our activities and provision, our donors of money, our donors of in-kind goods, and our donors of time, our volunteers. Without our donors this just could not happen"


