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Badminton Club

We would be pleased to see more people join us for a few games of a Monday evening, while keeping up with the social news at the same time. The Club may not have a 'mission statement' or be consciously pursuing an 'outreach' programme, but it has provided a place for members to chat about significant events in their lives, should they want to.

<u>Choir</u>

Since my last AGM report, we have seen a gradual relaxation of Covid rules and a resumption of the choir's normal activities. This process started last year with our traditional Advent and Christmas carol services, followed by our Lenten, Holy Week and Easter services. We have also seen the return of monthly evening services, which have included, in addition to the carol services, a commemoration of those who died during the Covid period, a Songs of Praise, two evensongs, and a Service of Thanksgiving for the life of HM Queen Elizabeth II – in all of these, the choir has played a major role. In addition, it has sung at funerals when requested to do so.

Singing has become easier as we have gradually abandoned the wearing of masks, which made it particularly difficult to sing, and with the removal of the perspex screens in front of the choir to prevent the spread of infection. We are now back to having a full Sung Eucharist every Sunday, at each of which the choir has sung an anthem during the administration, and no longer are we reducing the number of verses in every hymn. The choir has continued to have a 9.45am rehearsal every Sunday, and there has been a gradual return to having a weekday rehearsal: these now take place on alternate Thursdays at 5pm, and will move to late morning after the Wednesday eucharist from November, for which the church is heated, in order to avoid unnecessary heating costs.

I have written on numerous occasions in the past about the need to recruit new choir members, even on an occasional basis. If anything, this has become a more urgent need, and is essential if St Cuthbert's is to continue to have a choir to lead its services. Choir anthems now have to be selected extremely carefully, and it is sad that many of the largerscale anthems that we used to perform are no longer possible. In this, we are by no means alone: in recent years, we have "bucked a trend" in churches of the size of St Cuthbert's (many such churches no longer have a choir), and not least in our neighbouring church in Colinton Dell, where there are the same concerns about the future of the choir. As I wrote last year, I would be pleased to hear from anyone who feels that they can help with this year's Advent and Christmas Carol Services (or on a more regular basis), which need a strong contribution from the choir – if any of our regular members find themselves unable to sing at these services, radical changes would have to be made.

Finally, I would like to thank all members of the choir for their faithful attendance week by week, and Andrew Matheson, who has covered for me at the organ when I have been away on holiday.

Christian Aid

In March we held our annual Quiz Night, on Zoom for the second year. There were 7 teams with a total of 49 people from Edinburgh, England and Chicago. Graham and John as usual produced a great variety of questions, and Marie used her wonderful computer skills to ensure we were all in the correct 'rooms' at the right time! We raised over £500 for our Community Partnership in Bangladesh.

The Community Partnership scheme involves a local Christian Aid group has agreeing to raise £5,000 over 3 years for a particular project. This one in Bangladesh is then matchfunded 5:1 by the EU, thus raising in total £30,000. We organised Christian Aid Week in the same way as 2021: we delivered envelopes, and gave local addresses where they could be dropped off. We raised £3,500.

On the wider front, people in Colinton responded generously to the plea for books and paintings for the two annual sales in St. Andrews and St. George's Church: the Book Sale in May and the Sale of Pictures in October.

The Colinton Christian Aid Committee is made up of volunteers from the two churches, the Parish Church and our own. Join us! From St Cuthbert's you will know Wendy Pearson, Margaret Temple, Jean Wood and Patricia Brignall.

Eco Congregation: Engaging with Nature for the future

'As a congregation and as individuals we try to look after the environment' – this is the mission statement as it were of the Eco-congregation movement. Over the year since our last AGM I think we have continued this endeavour in various ways, and with a few of us now involved an application for a silver award is in progress.

We are blessed with a garden to bring us close to nature and this year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Nicki planted a tree at the congregation picnic on 5 June as part of Her Late Majesty's Green Canopy scheme. It will now be a special memorial to Queen Elizabeth II. We continue the cultivation of the wild flower section in the garden, and in June the Sunday school also planted some more plug plants there, chosen as bee and butterfly friendly.

A survey of the congregation in terms of members' 'carbon footprints' and ways they are saving energy, reducing travel and recycling was undertaken. Switching to the bamboo toilet paper in the church toilets was a further initiative in this direction.

Julia reports on the questionnaires: We had 18 responses. Everybody is taking some measures to be more environmentally friendly. For example, the majority don't heat all of their rooms and many try to buy more local produce, garden more sustainably and about half consider holidays that involve less travelling abroad. A full summary will be prepared for the Sign for the New Year.

We have continued to have eco-theme Sunday school sessions periodically. In February around St Valentines we made Green hearts to mark Gods love for us manifested in nature and our corresponding love for our green planet. On Mothering Sunday in March we sat together in the garden and talked about home and habitat, the tree as home to many creatures and the unseen connections of its roots below us, and signs of new life in its fresh new leaves.

In September and October our services have once again been marking Creationtide, an ecumenical initiative to think yearly about God's Creation. In Sunday school we have been taking the elements Water, Fire and Earth (Air still to come) and exploring their importance and in particular the many references in Bible passages and stories, and their use as symbols of God's power and also provision of all that we need. For Earth week, we planted bulbs and look forward to some new life next year in our garden.

It is in rising sea levels, wild fires and drought that we are warned of climate change and realise how precious are the elements in balance, and the need to protect and nurture the earth against harmful practices.

Lay Representative

Edinburgh South Area Council (ESAC) comprises, in addition to our own church; Christ Church Morningside, St Fillan's Buckstone, St Matthew's Roslin, St Michael and All Saints Tollcross, St John's West End and the joint charges of St James' Penicuik and St Mungo's West Linton. Each of the seven Diocese in the Scottish Episcopal is divided into a number of Area Councils that meet three times a year to discuss matters of common concern. These meetings usually occur shortly before the spring and autumn Diocesan Synods and in the summer before the General Synod which is a gathering of representatives from the seven diocese. Area Council meetings focus on the main agenda items of upcoming Synods and a rich variety of experience and views are shared. As Lay Representative of St Cuthbert's I come away feeling that I have learnt so much from others and hope that I make a meaningful contribution to the shared dialogue.

This year ESAC has met only twice, in March and October and at the time of writing the October Diocesan Synod is yet to meet, however there are continuing themes. Mission and Ministry; five mission principles were established in 2018 but limited resources has meant that only two of them could be given priority at the current time, namely Enabling Ministry and Developing Disciples.

This includes helping congregations to see other ways of 'doing' church and 'doing' mission. For example, in the Season of Pilgrimage to include a pilgrimage towards becoming carbon neutral by 2030 as part of our understanding of pilgrimage. Another aspect of mission is concern for our young people and the impact of the pandemic upon them. A concern that has resulted in the need to build and rebuild relationships in new and innovative ways.

In the Bishop's address he reflected on the war in Ukraine and our response to it, both theological and practical. Support for his Lent Appeal, 2022 being for the Welcoming; a charity to welcome 'New Scots', refugees and asylum seekers and support them in accessing services and to feel welcome and part of a diverse Scotland being one way we can respond. He urged us 'to pace ourselves, to endure, to be a people who do justice, act with kindness and walk humbly with the God we know in Jesus Christ.' It seems to me that is what our congregations aim for and for me meeting with the representatives of the charges in our Area Council never ceases to be strengthening and a source of inspiration in the imaginative, creative, and often simple but effective ideas and initiatives that we share in fellowship.

The Church continues to be very grateful for their assistance. The Property books, which had been removed during COVID, have been reinstated. If any issues are found, please enter them in the property books in the church or email – <u>stcuthbertsprop1@gmail.com</u>

Thanks are due to Ross and Iain who undertake small repairs throughout the church and are also extended to Marie (Church Administrator) for her continued assistance in organising and overseeing most of the annual inspections.

The work undertaken over the past year continues to come from the last Quinquennial report.

- Two significant areas of work identified on the rectory roof/windows has been completed.
- Note: A significant leak was noticed in the rectory during the last storms in September. A roof specialist has visited and further investigation is required around the roof cupola.
- Rectory windows most of the windows have been replaced with a significant improvement in heat retention being noticed. Three small velux windows and the large cupola roof window are being investigated to confirm whether replacement is possible.

- Work on parts of the church and rectory walls, to straighten up the walls that had been forced out by tree roots, has been completed.
- Rectory drive gate This has been replaced as old gate and mountings were rotten.
- Defibrillator Installation was completed in October 2021 and the defibrillator was officially registered in November 2021.
- Church organ The electrical supply for the old organ has been disconnected. This allowed for the removal of three electrical boxes that were potential asbestos hazards.
- Church main door railing Work to replace the railing, which was starting to rust from the bottom, is complete less painting.
- Lead was stolen from the Choir Vestry roof. Repairs have been completed.
- All the regular testing and maintenance of equipment has been carried out.


Thank you for your contributions and continued support. It is enjoyable putting each issue together, and wonderful to receive positive feedback such as "always a good read".
