The renovations in the hall have gone well throughout the summer with thanks to Marie for managing workers, timings and hall users. The Vestry appreciate that a lot of money was spent on this, while we run at a deficit. However, without the income from the hall, church giving is not enough to cover the costs of a rector, so it is vital that we keep the space to the highest standard to maintain and possibly increase the income.

Places of worship visited while in Finland



Helsinki Cathedral is the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Diocese of Helsinki.

The church was originally built from 1830 to 1852 as a tribute to the Grand Duke of Finland, Emperor Nicholas I of Russia. It was also known as St Nicholas's Church.



Porvoo Cathedral hosted the joint celebration Eucharist to mark the signing of a formal agreement between the British and Irish Anglican churches and the Nordic (Scandinavian) and Baltic Lutheran churches (completed in 1992), which took its name from Porvoo as the Porvoo Common Statement theological agreement, forming the Porvoo Communion. The church was originally made of wood with the first stone walls being built between 1410 and 1420.



Espoo Cathedral is a medieval parish church and cathedral in Espoo, Finland. It is the seat of the Evangelical Lutheran Diocese of Espoo, established in 2004. The oldest parts of the church were completed in the 1480s and it is thus the oldest preserved building in the city.





Kellokosken Church was built in 1734 by the factory workers in the area. The original wooden pews remain and is known (lovingly) as the most uncomfortable church in Tuusula. As you enter to worship, you pick up your liturgy book and a cushion.

VESTRY REPORT Vestry July 2025

- Reserves Policy- Heather has provided suggestions and information, which will be discussed further at the next meeting of the Reserves policy group before being presented to Vestry.
- A submission to the Diocese about the current life of St Cuthbert's with pictures and a short statement of what is important to us in a new Bishop has been submitted within the deadline.
- Heather sent a short statement: that there had been no progress in her obtaining the banking mandate for the account or the income allocations from the first part of the year. Marie and Heather hoped to resolve this the following week.
- Edinburgh Refugee Sponsorship Circle proposal to contribute to buying a property to house a refugee family: Vestry gave the information presented much prayerful and careful consideration but unanimously decided against getting involved in this proposal but wish them every success in their endeavor. Julia will notify ERSC.
- An email was received from a member of the congregation with documents from 2010 and 2021 concerning forward planning and fundraising. Vestry thanks this member for this reminder of ideas and suggestions put forward.
- Global South Bursary and visiting priest possibility. We have received a generous donation towards the rent for the priest in this scheme (Cletus who is aiming to do a PH.D at Herriot Watt University) and we have acquired accommodation. The deposit and first month's rent on this have already been paid. Nicki managed to furnish the property with the help of friends and provide broadband with the sponsorship of the Colinton Inn.

- The lights and electronic blinds in the hall have been fitted.
- The work and insulation under the window in the rectory kitchen have been completed and the cat flap in the door has been removed and door repaired. The kitchen replacement is to take place in September.
- The new notice board on the corner has been completed but a small fir tree nearby obscures the noticeboard, and Bryan thinks its removal the best option.
- The picnic event with the Ukrainians went well and was a
 wonderful opportunity to talk to them and build relationships.
 We hope to have a similar event in January when there is to be
 a week of prayer for Christian Unity, and we could have a soup
 lunch together on the Sunday.
- Kay and Nicki are to attend the Net Zero Roadshow.
- Cletus is due to speak about himself in church on 3rd August.
- September is the season of creation and in October we have Sea Sunday.
- Vestry agreed that there wasn't a need for a Vestry meeting in August.
- Julia proposed that she be paid for one hour less cleaning a week while the hall is being refurbished. Vestry agreed.
- Kay suggested that the new local representative for the Leprosy Mission come to give us a brief talk during the sermon part of the Sunday service. This was agreed.

Message for September from Revd Margaret.

When you read this, we will be hurtling rapidly into September – where did the summer go? However, there's something inherently appealing about autumn, with stunning, vibrant colours on trees and shrubs. We have much to be thankful for in Colinton, with so many trees around, so many beautiful private gardens, plus glorious open spaces in which to enjoy the benefits of nature.

Nature, the natural world, God's creation – the subject chosen in our liturgical calendar to celebrate in September. As we get older and the seasons speed by, it becomes easier to recall the changes we witness over the year, from bare tree branches to soft green leaves, magnificent spring blooms, and then the full dress code for summer, abundant colourful flowers, luxuriant green, and now, as autumn approaches, the golds and rusts of the leaves.

And this is what I wish to concentrate on during this Creation season – not the negatives of which we are all too aware, the negatives of our poor stewardship, a stewardship to which we were called by God from the very beginning, a role in which we have increasingly failed, leading to accelerated climate change, pollution and declining biodiversity. But there is still so much hope if we concentrate on all that's good about God's creation: 'God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good.' (Genesis 1:31.) As creator, he wove a rich tapestry, with all the elements possessing an essential interconnectedness. Surely that should be an inspiration for us to take more responsibility, in whatever way we can, for our amazing environment in the future.

With that in mind I turn to the subject of our monthly Thursday afternoon services, the next one taking place on the 4th September, in which I shall be addressing the subject of creation. I have chosen to present four particular features of creation - trees, birds, water and fire – purely as representative of the incredible variety of elements surrounding us in the environment. Then in October, Caroline will be speaking on 'Old Age in the Bible'. As many of us now find ourselves in that category, it will be fascinating to find out how that age group features in the Bible! So, please do come along and join in the services and then partake of refreshments and fellowship in the hall afterwards.

In the meantime, I wish you all a happy journey into autumn and a hopeful, joyous season of creation.



Summer Evensongs

7th September 5th October – Harvest Festal Evensong

An introduction from Rev. Cletus:

I present to you a little introduction about myself and my mission here through the inspiration of the word of God in the words of St. Paul to the Roman in 8:28 "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose".

I was born into a typical Roman Catholic family from the Northern part of Ghana. I have 5 siblings of which 4 of us are males, and I am the third born among them.

My education from basic to the university level came through from faith-based schools. While still at the basic school I got captivated so much with nature (particularly the sun and the trees) which would soon be the medium to hear the call of God to religious life and ministry. Indeed, I got myself wondering about nature and that led me to a deep interest to know about the one behind it. As it became increasingly clear that God was behind every beautiful piece of nature, it was not difficult deciding to study about the Great architect behind the architecture.

I enrolled into the seminary in 1998 after my high school and three years later have to further readjust my interest and curiosity for adventure by moving from the diocesan to the religious missionary ticket – the desire to serve God and His people in an unknown land. I had my first profession of religious vows in 2004 with the Divine Word Missionaries (SVD) back in Ghana and proceeded to study theology in the same seminary where I had completed my philosophical studies before the profession of vows.

Rather than offering myself for ordination in 2008 after my theological studies I went into teaching to create time for more reflection as to whether I was really being called to become a celibate priest in the Roman Catholic Church. Little did I know it would take me 9 years to discern this call, but rather from the pews of the Anglican Church. I got received into the Anglican Church with my deaconate and priestly ordination in the Anglican Diocese of Koforidua in 2016.

With my purpose and mission now very clear, I wasted no time in getting married in 2017 to the best lady in the whole world. She is called Joyce. Again, no time wasted in getting a baby for the first time, oh my gracious, Cyril Jnr in 2018, and another one, Cyprian - but only after 4 years. My 'Baby' girl Joyce, and my two boys Cyril and Cyprian, wave at you as a church, in thanksgiving to God for accepting me into your church community in Scotland.

My Mission in Scotland

I got my student visa to come to Heriot Watt University to pursue Church Leadership and Management, PhD after having deferred the programme three times owning to lack of sponsorship. However, the sponsorship ticket that brought me here also became unavailable two months after my arrival owing to a family dispute over the very business that would have sponsored my tuition fees. This left me hanging, worried and confused, humanly speaking, as to what to do until May 9, 2025. However, three things I did repeatedly during this period were, my wife and I prayed, I wrote applications upon applications, I spoke with some priests and bishops. The long and short of the story is my presence here today. Now I can only say:

- Thanks to Global Partnership Committee (GPC) of the Scottish Episcopal Church who came to my rescue with a partial scholarship to cater for what is most important – tuition fees
- o Thanks to the leadership of St. Cuthbert Episcopal Church who responded to the call and plea of Bishop John for a quasi-parish as one of the fulfilments of the conditions of the scholarship by GPC.
- Thanks to your individual hospitality and generosity I have settled in in record time.

With thanksgiving to God and for each one of you, permit me Rev'd Nicki, to mention, the sacrifice and love that has gone in to securing an accommodation for me by one of you, my welfare sponsorship that has been dripping in, even by individuals I am yet to know. While I continue to pray to God to favour you and your families, I ask for your individual and communal support in any way possible to secure the other half of my scholarship to enable me have peace of mind for my studies.

I am here for the Church in spirit and body, to serve and to live my missionary desire and adventure. I am already excited to be an associate tutor of the Scottish Episcopal Institute of Theology that is into the training of our future priests and theologians. I have always loved to do this – teaching and talking about leadership in God's way to God's people.

It is my fervent prayer that my presence in your church community in the parochial and in the diocesan setting will be a good ground for further growth in areas beyond my expectations. Join me to pray to God to be more of an instrument of blessing in every moment of my endeavours.

May St. Cuthbert keep interceding of our individual needs and the needs of our families and community. Amen!

Bursting Berry Bake

Ingredients

Butter, to grease 150 g blackberries 100 g blueberries 150 g raspberries 15 g flaked almonds

For the batter

50 g caster sugar75 g plain flour40 g ground almonds3 medium eggs, lightly beaten

200 g natural yoghurt1 Tbsp. vanilla bean paste



Method

Preheat oven to 190°C (170°C fan) mark 5. Grease a 20.5cm-23cm (8-9in) ceramic fluted flan or pie dish (or use a similar sized ovenproof serving dish).

Whisk the sugar, flour and ground almonds to combine. Add the eggs, yogurt and vanilla and whisk until smooth (alternatively whizz all the batter ingredients in a blender). Scrape into greased dish and scatter over berries, followed by almonds.

Bake for 35-40min until lightly golden and puffed. Allow to sit for 10min before lightly dusting with icing sugar and serving.

Very French! They might call this a Clafoutis! It'll disappear like snow off a dyke whatever you call it!




Congratulations Kate!

New Appeals

Danja Hospital in Niger is a lifeline for people affected by leprosy. Rebuilding is required of the wards and toilets which are in a bad state of repair. The hospital is like a beacon of hope in the midst of the desert, and on the TLM website is a moving story about Adam from Libya whose life was transformed through the treatment and love he found there.

In Myanmar people affected by leprosy have become hidden, caught up in the crisis of political and economic turmoil. Travel is dangerous because of gunfire, electricity supply is unreliable and there is widespread jobloss and poverty. TLM is supporting the training and equipping of community health volunteers to find cases of leprosy and take treatment to them.


