

Dear Friends,

I hope this finds you all well and warm, as we currently go through a very cold spell in Edinburgh. This hasn't been helped with difficulties with the heating in church and the hall, which has taken a while to rectify. My apologies to anyone who has been affected by this and thanks to Mario. Early in January the Vestry and others who participate in leading groups in church got together for a day of fellowship, idea sharing and thinking about the future of St. Cuthbert's. We were accompanied through the afternoon by Revd Canon Oliver Brewer-Lennon, Vice-Provost of St. Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow, who helped us identify our own gifts and learn about the gifts others had. We are blessed at St. Cuthbert's with people of many and varied gifts and as Jesus called the disciples, he is also calling us to use them for the benefit of St. Cuthbert's and God.

One group using their gifts is the fundraising and events group. I attended a meeting to learn of their plans for the coming months and was so impressed with their generosity of time and their forthcoming plans for community building and fundraising to beat the deficit we have. I hope you feel able to support them in all they plan to do in the coming year.

We had a 'Dean's Visitation' in January, where she inspected all our registers and made sure we are up to date with all things as listed in Canon Law. You will be pleased to hear that we are doing everything as we should, and I thank the Vestry (past and present) for all their help in bringing all documentation up to date.

Later in the month I will be having my annual retreat with people I studied with at Cranmer Hall, Durham. Each year we visit a Cathedral City, enabling us to participate in all their worship as part of our retreat. It is so affirming to get together, because of the peer and prayer support we give each other during this time. This year we are visiting Winchester.

Although Christmas is a long time past, I wanted to share with you the joy of welcoming so many visitors over the period. Particularly the Crib Service (120) where Judith was a great cat, and Midnight Mass (132). It was lovely to see so many people enjoying the worship and experiencing the beauty of St. Cuthbert's.

We also had Carols at The Collie, where 80 people joined us and 51 Bde Carol Service, where some members of the Army Cadet Force joined us.



This year's Diocesan Lent Course focusses on The Emotions of Jesus.




Through the course, you are invited to encounter Jesus and to explore your own emotions through some of the emotions we see in him through the gospel stories.



FEBRUARY 2024 Music Notes

By the time that this article appears in print, our new digital organ will have been in place and in use for a year. As organist, I continue



to be very pleased with it and the way in which it is able to lead our worship, and continue to thoroughly enjoy playing it. Choir and organist have quickly grown accustomed to its location underneath the pipework of the old organ case, and there have been very few hitches in the course of this process. The room that has been created under the tower, where the former pipe organ was located, is now working well as a choir music library, whilst also providing a suitable space for the storage of altar frontals.

Readers might be interested to hear what has happened to our previous digital organ, which was nearly twenty-five years old and was sold to Allens in part-exchange for our new instrument. After it was removed from St Cuthbert's, it was taken to the company's workshop near High Wycombe, where it was given a thorough overhaul, and then put up for sale on the company's website, with replacement speakers as we retained our existing ones. It is now back in Scotland, having been purchased by a Roman Catholic church on the edge of Glasgow, which previously did not have an organ. There, it has been well received and is serving the church well – it is good to know that it has gone to a good home!

It is hard to believe that, with Christmas now behind us, we will shortly be moving into Lent in the middle of the month. The anthems planned for the choir to sing at our services in February are detailed below.

Arunima Hospice in The Diocese of Calcutta:

Embarking on my third visit to the Arunima Hospice in the Diocese of Calcutta, Church of North India, from November 30th to December 5th, was a heart-warming experience. This journey began in 2015 when I first became involved with this important cause, supporting children orphaned or abandoned due to the stigma surrounding their HIV/AIDS status. The hospice currently houses 56 such children.

The six days involved immersing myself in the lives of these incredible children I've come to now call family. From engaging in playful activities to accompanying them to school, celebrating their academic milestones, and delighting in their singing and dancing, each interaction left a lasting memory. Among the highlights was organizing an outing to Nicco Park—an amusement haven where laughter filled the air as they enjoyed thrilling rides, concluding with shared delights of ice cream.

Accompanying me on this trip was my Diocesan Bishop, Ian Paton, whose presence was greatly valued, especially when we danced with the children! Welcoming him to the hospice, amidst his busy schedule with Bishop Paritosh Canning, was a moment of happiness. He learned about the various initiatives we've supported, a legacy nurtured by our former Primus and Bishop, David Chillingworth, who continues to be fondly remembered here.

Summarizing the multitude of incredible experiences in this short piece seems impossible. Witnessing the progress made in educating others about HIV/AIDS stigma was heartening. Several of the children, once confined by circumstances, are now pursuing higher education at colleges and universities—something

unimaginable in 2015. This transformation is a testament to the unwavering dedication and hard work of Hospice Manager, Mr. Suvabrota Das, and his exceptional team under the amazing oversight of Bishop Paritosh.

As part of my grant application, I was awarded £500 for the implementation of a self-sustainable vegetable and herb garden. The ground was blessed and prayed for by Bishop Ian during his visit. Moreover, one of the older boys will be sent to Horticultural College to learn the skills required to maintain this important initiative.

My gratitude extends to the Global Partnerships Committee whose support made this journey possible. The Arunima Hospice continues to remain a strong part of my ministry and outreach.



'Almost White' Bread with Stoneground Flours

Making your first loaf of bread, and you want something that's like a regular white loaf but a bit more special? Then this very easy almost-white loaf will be a great place to start. Quick to mix together, almost no kneading, and rich with flavour. You can make it with all-white flour but start with a little experimentation. Choose wholemeal - or rye, spelt, emmer, kamut – mixed with a regular strong white bread flour, and you'll get a result to be proud of!

Ingredients:

1 tsp fast-action yeast
1 tsp sea salt
1 tsp honey
100g wholemeal (or rye, spelt, emmer, kamut) flour
300g lukewarm water (35c in winter, 20c in summer)
350g strong white bread flour
oil for folding the dough
flour for shaping the dough
butter or oil for greasing the tin



Things you'll need:

A Mixing Bowl A dough whisk Kitchen scales A 2lb bread tin a plastic dough scraper a jug for water

a really sharp knife/blade/dough scoring knife/pair of scissors

Method

- 1. Measure the yeast, salt, honey, and wholemeal flour in a mixing bowl, keep the salt and yeast apart in the bowl. Pour on the warm water and use your dough whisk to mix everything together until smooth.
- 2. Add the white flour and mix to a smooth soft dough. No need to knead it but do let the machine stir it well to make sure there are no lumps or patches of dry flour. Cover the bowl and leave for 30 minutes (at room temperature, about 20C).
- 3. Rub oil onto a patch of worktop, an area about 30cm in diameter, and scoop the dough onto it with your scraper.

With oily fingers, pat the dough out about 2cm thick, then stretch fold it in on itself by thirds like you were folding a beach towel, first one way and then the other. Then flip the dough over and scoop it back in bowl for another 30 minutes.

4. Rub the inside of your bread tin with butter to stop the dough from sticking.

This time, lightly flour a patch of worktop, an area about 30cm in diameter, and scoop the dough onto it again with your scraper. With floured fingers, press the dough out once more to about 2cm thick, but this time fold the left and right sides in so they meet in the middle. Then roll the dough up tightly into a scroll, and place seam-side down in the tin.

Cover and leave at room temperature for an hour, it will rise by about 50% but not quite double.

6. Heat the oven to 200C fan. Sprinkle the top with flour. Using a blade (or a pair of scissors) slash or snip a criss-cross pattern on the top of the loaf. Place the tin in the oven, shut the door and bake for 35 - 40 minutes. Remove from the oven, leave to cool slightly then remove from the tin and leave sitting on a wire rack until cold before slicing.

My guess is you'll try and cut it while it's still warm....

A wee fact:

Roller-milling is how most of the white bread flour in the world is milled, whereas stone-milling is that way all flour used to be milled.

Did you know?

The finger prod is one of the best ways of calling proof for the home baker... Gently prod the tip of your finger into your risen bread dough and see how quickly the dough springs back into shape.

If this happens quickly then your dough needs to proof a bit more as the dough is still elastic and tight.

If it springs back slowly this means your dough is light and airy and ready for the oven.

If it does not spring back then your dough is over-proofed as it is too gassy and its structure is breaking down.


