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Badminton Club

St Cuthbert's Badminton Club gives a friendly welcome and encouragement to players of all abilities and ages and meets for 2 hours on a Monday evening in the church hall from late September until the week before Easter. The 2022/2023 season saw the welcome return to post pandemic normal good hygiene practices.

There are usually eight to thirteen players on any evening, and we are rotated by the nominated game organiser to play doubles throughout the evening enjoying friendly conversation between games and a mid-evening tea and biscuit. Members find a listening and caring ear should they want it, and the atmosphere is one of acceptance and support.

From September 2022, we welcomed three new regular players from the community, either as a response to advertising in a local magazine or introduced as an acquaintance of a church member.

The club continues with a core of players from the church congregation who help to run the club, with much of the work being done currently and in past years by Archie Clark. From September 2022 Julia Roberts agreed to take over the Treasurer's role. Anyone from the congregation wanting some gentle exercise and to give badminton a go would be welcomed, but increasingly new members are from the local community, and we will continue to advertise the club in the

local press with the aim of maintaining a healthy number of players.

Choir

The past year has been the first "normal" year for the choir since Covid first hit, although, unavoidably, attendance has been hit by Covid from time to time.

The choir has continued to lead the singing and contribute an anthem at all of our services, including the "summer season" Evensongs, and playing a particularly important part in Advent, at Christmas, Holy Week and Easter, Harvest, and at other significant times. Unfortunately, it has also had to play a part in quite a number of funerals, including that of Rosemary Yeoman, a faithful and committed choir member, who will be greatly missed from our ranks.

One of the difficulties of maintaining what is now a smaller choir is the restriction that it places on repertoire, which has to be chosen extremely carefully to suit the resources available, whilst providing music that our members will enjoy singing. We are therefore very grateful for the donation of a set of new anthem books and some additional carol books in memory of Gwen Sidebotham, which have provided some new and attractive music for us to learn.

One of the very significant events of 2023 was the arrival of the new digital organ, which is a vast improvement on its predecessor. It took a little while for the choir members to get used to the organist being back amongst them, as in the days of the old pipe organ, but it now feels absolutely normal. The other benefit has been the creation of a room for storing the choir's music library where the old pipes were sited under the tower, thereby creating space in the choir vestry for other uses. The acquisition of the new instrument has certainly set the church up for many years to come and is a pleasure to play.

As ever, the small numbers in the choir continue to give cause for concern, and additional support from those in the congregation who can help on special occasions is both much needed and appreciated. Sincere thanks go to all members of the choir for their faithful attendance week by week, and to Andrew Matheson and Xuan Wang, who have deputized for me at the organ.

Christian Aid

There were two main fund-raising events this year: the Quiz Night and the week-long Christian Aid House-to-House Collection.

After two years of quizzing by Zoom we were able to meet once again in person. We were delighted to host 55 people in 7 teams under the aegis of Graham, our stalwart Quiz Master. £720 was raised for our Community Partnership in Bangladesh, which is match-funded 5:1 by the EU.

During Christian Aid Week we delivered 750 envelopes which, when filled, could be dropped off at a nearby address, and we also supplied a way of giving online. Only 107 envelopes were returned. 22 people used the JustGiving website. Small numbers, but great generosity - £3,153, much of which was Gift Aided.

The Colinton Christian Aid Committee is made up of volunteers from two churches, the Parish Church and our own, but there have been a number of retirements in the last 5 years. As I have been on the Committee since 1994, I think it is now time for me to join that group and I will be resigning at the end of March next year.

On behalf of the Committee and of Christian Aid I would like thank the congregation for their generosity, interest and help over the last couple of decades.

Eco Congregation: Engaging with Nature for the future

In the early spring it was lovely to see the bulbs that we planted in Sunday school coming out around the newly planted tree to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, reminding us that the cycle of the seasons is ever turning. When we planted the bulbs last October we thought about the element of earth. It is at the very heart of all our natural world.

We had an 'Eco Sunday school' on 5 February when we went into the garden in winter, and identified the plants we could see and looked for birds in the bare trees. Perception –

Patience – Purpose came to mind as guides: observing nature and what can be seen at any time of the year; waiting for signs of awakening growth and hibernating animals as we look forward to spring; trying to learn more about God's wonderful Creation – looking to Lent and thinking how we can take actions to look after the planet in each of our lives. Themes which can apply to us all, not just the children. It is all about the future. We thought too about the love which came to us at Christmas: our sign was making hearts to put in the window, a sign of our thankfulness for nature and our caring for it and each other.

We now no longer have the Sunday School where Caroline incorporated many activities on Creation, nature activities, and awareness of eco-friendly practices. We do have the church garden, expertly looked after by the garden group, which includes a wildlife meadow area, a constant reminder of the importance of nature around us.

Recently in the Season of Creation in September our services in church had a green order of service and liturgy focusing on care for creation.

In the wider context, there are many opportunities in Edinburgh to network with church groups through the Eco congregation in terms of meetings and workshops. Recently there has been a consultation as part of the Scottish Government's Just Transition Plan to gather views in three sectors – Land use and agriculture; Built environment and construction; Transport. This relates to the Eco-Congregation's 'supporting action that is fair and just to

tackle the climate emergency without impacting most on those facing most disadvantage'.

Events & Fundraising

This group was formed, initially with some Vestry members, to begin to take some positive steps to focus on fund raising both within the church and reaching out to the wider community. It soon became clear that this indeed meant hosting and staging events so church social events now come within the remit of the group. Since April 2022 the group has worked on seven events, Brew & Bingo, the Christmas Fayre, the Daffodil Tea, the Coronation Picnic, Armed Forces Day, the 130th Anniversary Party and the party for Harvest and Lesley's farewell. We also tried to revive the second hand book sales but decided that this was considerable work for little reward and we donated all the remaining books to the Christian Aid Sale in May. Although the sums are not always great every event has made money for St Cuthbert's and there is now a dedicated part of the accounts to record fund raising. We are busy preparing for the Christmas Fayre to be held in the hall on Saturday 25th November from 2-5pm and we have a date booked for another springtime tea on 13th April 2024. We are looking at other possible opportunities both to gather together and to raise money. We aim to try and organise 3 or 4 events each year. If anyone has a suggestion for an event please speak to a member of the group. All ideas are welcome.

We would like to say a very special thank you to Margaret Holmes who has stepped down from the group. Margaret was for many years responsible for all special events and catering at St Cuthbert's. Her wonderful enthusiasm, great ideas, efficiency and attention to detail gave us Burns Suppers, Harvest lunches, Christmas teas, picnics and much more. She also ensured that there were always supplies of anything that might be needed for catering from cups to cling film. Thank you Margaret for everything you have done.

Foodbanks

Holy Trinity Foodbank:

Members of our congregation have supported this Foodbank, in Wester Hailes, for over 11 years. Initially with food donations, then cash & food and latterly with cash. The steep increase in the price of food and fuel has seen many more people turning to foodbanks for help and the foodbanks find it more and more challenging as their costs are rising too. Patricia and I continue to collect cash from any members of St.Cuthbert's who would like to donate in this way. However the cash we collect has gone down over the years as many church members are now paying this foodbank directly so that gift aid can be collected. As far as I can gather, in the financial year ending 5th April 2023, over £6,000 was donated by members of St.Cuthbert's. Our continued support of this foodbank is very much appreciated by them.

St Salvador's Community Food Initiative:

The Community Food Initiative at St Salvador's Episcopal Church in Stenhouse, Edinburgh is open to anyone in the

local area who is experiencing financial difficulties. An important aspect of the initiative is that no referral is needed. It relies entirely on donations and volunteers and is open every Wednesday between 12 noon and 1.30pm. Numbers attending the initiative have grown steadily (and indeed significantly) since Revd Andrew Bain became priest in charge. He stepped down last year and Revd Dr Stephen Holmes took over with assistance from Revd Dr Ross Jesmont, who has taken much responsibility for the running of the initiative and acquisition of food. Today (Wednesday 24th October, 2023), for instance, there were 110 food parcels distributed which, though high, was not untypical of the volume of help given. There is usually a supply of fresh food which may include fruit, vegetables and other perishable items. Many of those seeking help are young people and families mostly from the local area, though in a few cases coming from the other side (or even outside) of Edinburgh. There is a dedicated team of volunteers some of whom have been recruited from those attending the initiative and tea, coffee and biscuits are served during and after the distribution of parcels. The initiative is wonderfully blessed by a communion service prior to the distribution of food, attended by both volunteers as well as some seeking support. This is so much more than a 'food bank' and richly deserves our support. At present there is a particular need for tinned fish and toiletries.

Lay Representative

In his address to the Diocesan Synod held earlier this year, the bishop reflected on optimism and hopefulness. He suggested that although they were close allies, they were not the same. Even when we are at our most pessimistic, "Our hope is bult on Christ". We are, he said, "to be a hopeful community, not a delusional community". This hope, he said, "compelled us to build partnerships with others and to reach outwards beyond the bounds of church, nation and even species, to include all living things."

I write this, only days ago having attended the Autumn Diocesan Synod, where the agenda focussed on Administration, Finance and Management and towards the end, Investing in the Future. The latter is a new initiative to develop the Church through investment in supporting particular charges and developing new mission initiatives. It is a major mission development. that involves a commitment to draw down up to £750,000 from investments over a five-year period and using this to support existing charges with significant development prospects. Charges which, although struggling, have within them the 'spark' of regeneration, for example, in areas of new housing development and population growth. In addition the need to sustain charges in areas of special social need is equally important.

Projects are already underway in St Peter's Galashiels and St John's Selkirk, St John's Jedburgh and St Cuthbert's Hawick, St Matthew's Roslin, St David's Pilton and Priory Church South Queensferry. The previous A7 Partnership covering St Peter's Galashiels, St John's Selkirk and St Cuthbert's Hawick ended in the summer of 2002. Several people spoke passionately about their churches, and what the opportunity to be involved in this development means to them. An agreement between the Society of St Francis and the vestry of St David's Pilton has resulted in three Franciscan Brothers being welcomed back into St David's, and into the local community where previously they were very much a part.

It is acknowledged that there is a need to invigorate all Area Councils to bring co-ordinated proposals forward in this process. I found this so heartening as I have always felt that the role of Area Councils is important. They offer the opportunity for the sharing of ideas of innovative ways of being Church in different locations, where a sharing of local priorities and knowledge can take place. It is refreshing. Since the pandemic, however it has been difficult to gather people together face to face in the way that it was once possible, or so it seems in our Area Council (South Edinburgh Area Council). At our Spring gathering only two lay representatives came along, in addition to me and the Chair, Robin Quinn, who is the Lay representative from Christ Church. The meeting did, however, provide a rich sharing of thoughts and ideas. The meeting immediately prior to the Autumn Diocesan Synod was better attended and I hope this is a sign of regeneration after the disruptive period of the pandemic. I am now stepping down as Lay representative at

St Cuthbert's. It is an exhilarating time for someone else to be taking over this role, equally a good time for me to be stepping down.

St Cuthbert's Playgroup

The parents and carers really value the sessions and are appreciative of our hard work.


